Disaster Preparedness Day, April 22, 9:45am

Join your neighbors, communities and government agencies in a "Drop, Cover and Hold" drill at 9:45am, April 22. At that moment, people across Washington will practice their personal actions during and immediately following an earthquake. It's a great opportunity to check your disaster plan and preparedness. Wherever you are at 9:45am on April 22, drop to the ground under a sturdy piece of furniture if possible. Hang onto it so the movement of the earth doesn't cause it to move away from you. Then, walk through your escape routes and check that they are uncluttered. You should also verify that your escape routes are not likely to be blocked by falling debris.

Make sure everyone in your home knows how to turn off utilities: propane, electricity and water. Take this opportunity to check and refresh your supply of emergency food, water and medications. Verify that all household members carry out-of-state contact information. Lastly, call your out-of-state contact person to remind them of their important role in helping separated family members reunite when local landlines and cellular phone services are overwhelmed following a major disaster such as a devastating earthquake.

We commend the efforts of some Greater Hansville residents to become prepared for disaster and strongly encourage more of you to get involved. In the wake of a major earthquake or other disaster you must be prepared to rely on yourselves and your neighbors.
