

Suquamish Citizen Advisory Committee Meeting Minutes

June 7, 2018

PROCEEDINGS

Meeting began at 1801.

Meeting Minutes for April were approved.

Public Comment: Concern for speeding was highlighted on Division Ave. and Geneva, Brockton Ave., and Sound View. Primarily the high traffic times but also late evening (11PM). Officer Creed noted these concerns.

Allan H. recommended that the SCAC provide a motion to the County Commissioners regarding upcoming Commissioner vote on the increase in car tabs and banning of plastic bags. He was not pleased that the citizens were not voting on this issue. The question was tabled to the end of meeting.

Meeting Core

Suquamish Tribal Police noted mail theft as a high volume crime lately (notable locations are dark areas without motion lights or places where people aren't picking up their mail frequently). Again, strong neighborhood support is beneficial to deterring these activities. The Casino is noting that people setting wallets or phones next to themselves on a table are having them stolen. Unlocked cars are again a challenge and counterfeit bills are on the rise.

Peter B. updated us about the limited amendments being considered for the Kitsap County Comprehensive Plan (the guiding describes the 20-year vision for unincorporated Kitsap County and how that vision will be achieved, including land use, economic development, environment, housing and human services, transportation, capital facilities and utilities as well as parks, recreation, and open space). Tom C. brought up how the briefing applied to the Suquamish LAMIRD to include the narrowness of our streets. The bulk of the changes address administrative adjustments to the plan but there will be specific actions that examine the Kingston UGA and the Georges Corner LAMIRD. The

John Clauson, Executive Director of Kitsap Transit, provided an update to routed service (later and earlier hours are anticipated as well as modifications to route structure to make the communities more connected and the routes more efficient). The Kingston foot ferry and implications for Suquamish were discussed. In summary, the 35 minute Kingston foot ferry is expected to be running starting in the Fall (conservatively October was preferred as a start date). A reservation system is not planned at this point due to the larger capacity of the craft. There will be scheduling challenges for working into pier space in Seattle but that is being aggressively addressed by Kitsap Transit with the support of Commissioner Gelder engaging (along with a Puget Sound consortium) the City of Seattle. The draft schedule was centered around commuting times right now but might expand.

Suquamish Nature Preserve Connection Trail

Park maintenance with Suquamish Garden Club (Sports Court, Angeline, Pathway Park and Suquamish Nature Preserve)

- Transit update (Kevin McD). Update was addressed in discussion with John C.
- Suquamish Way Pedestrian and Drainage Improvements (Tina N.). Great job Tina and the Public Works team for the Suquamish Way work as well as mowing on Miller Bay and street sweeping!!




Meeting was concluded at 2017.
