The purpose of this addendum is to answer questions regarding the RFP and to Extend the Submittal Deadline to Wednesday November 30,2022 @2:00PM.

### **QUESTIONS:**

1. "We are interested in your GROSS Grant Consultant RFP (#2022-144) and wanted like to know if there is any budget or funding information you could share. Is there a contract amount that cannot be exceeded or a range that WSSOG is looking to stay in?"

Answer: Yes, we can share that the contract amount cannot exceed \$30,000.

2. "Is the project county-wide?"

Answer: This project encompasses the geographic regions of the West Sound Stormwater Outreach Group (WSSOG): Kitsap County and the cities of Bainbridge Island, Bremerton, Gig Harbor, Kitsap County, Port Angeles, Port Orchard and Poulsbo.

- 3. Is it safe to assume that you are defining "overburdened community" in alignment with the <u>Healthy</u> Environment for All Act (2021)?
  - a. a geographic area where vulnerable populations face combined, multiple environmental harms and health impacts, and includes, but is not limited to, highly impacted communities as defined in RCW 19.405.020



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#### Answer:

The Western Washington Phase II Municipal Stormwater Permit defines overburdened communities as" minority, low-income, tribal, or indigenous populations or geographic locations in Washington State that potentially experience disproportionate environmental harms and risks. This disproportionality can be as a result of greater vulnerability to environmental hazards, lack of opportunity for public participation, or other factors. Increased vulnerability may be attributable to an accumulation of negative or lack of positive environmental, health, economic, or social conditions within these populations or places. The term describes situations where multiple factors, including both environmental and socio-economic stressors, may act cumulatively to affect health and the environment and contribute to persistent environmental health disparities."
