In 2021, under County Ordinance #601-2021, the Kitsap County Board of Commissioners adopted updates to the Countywide Planning Policies (CPP). These CPP's were developed by the Kitsap Regional Coordinating Council (KRCC) consistent with Puget Sound Regional Council's (PSRC) Vision 2050 and with state law changes that occurred since the CPP's were last updated in 2015. Those revisions were reviewed by several technical and policy committees as a first step towards the changes needed in advance of the 2024 Comprehensive Plan update.

The current CPP update includes evaluation and adoption of a new appendix that includes Housing Allocations (Appendix F) through 2044. The allocations are a response to new state legislation (HB 1220) and changes to the Growth Management Act (GMA) that require counties to "provide for and accommodate" housing affordable to all income levels. This is a stronger and more detailed requirement than the former goal of encouraging affordable housing. These housing allocations were adopted by the KRCC on June 6, 2023, and now need to be adopted by the Kitsap County Board of County Commissioners per Appendix A prior to being effective.

Within the existing population distributions shown in Appendix B-1, the housing allocations to be added to Appendix F of the CPPs establish a total of 32,951 new housing units for Kitsap County. Unincorporated Kitsap County and the four incorporated cities with Kitsap County (Bainbridge, Bremerton, Port Orchard, and Poulsbo) have been allocated a specific number of the total new housing units required. Each of these areas are required to designate a portion of the new housing units for high, middle, and low-incoming housing, emergency housing, and non-permanent supportive housing.
