❖ Future Projects: Progress and Next Steps

- Housing Need Projection: High level projection in three categories:
 - Affordable Housing - Kirsten will begin formulating a draft overview based on income, cost, and current availability
 - Specialty Housing - Permanent Supportive Housing for a variety of needs. Rochelle will begin compiling data from existing KMH studies.
 - Temporary Housing : Shelter beds, tiny homes
- Asset Map: Updated Graphic of Housing/Services Inter-connections (with specific orgs) - Tabled
- Comprehensive List of Existing Data and Sources related to homelessness and affordable housing - Tabled

NEXT STEPS

Group will begin working on high level housing needs projections for affordable housing, specialty housing, and temporary housing.
